Johannes Gutenberg Born: 1395 Died: 1468 | Mainz, Germany

Gutenberg's invention helped spread the ideas of the Reformation to the masses

Could Johannes Gutenberg have known when he first conceived the idea of moveable type that it would contribute to the spread of the Reformation and the Renaissance and lead to the education of all levels of society? One might question his presence in the "Faces of the Reformation" series. But considering that his presses printed not only Luther's 95 Theses but also the papal indulgences that sparked Luther's polemic

pen, it seems fitting that he should be included.

Gutenberg was born about 1395 as the son of a metalsmith, and he became acquainted with the printing business at a very young age. His invention of the moveable type press made the mass production of books a reality that would change the world. By 1450, his new invention was operating. As with most new ideas of this scale, the road was not smooth. In 1446, Johann Fust, Gutenburg's financial backer, won a lawsuit against him regarding repayment of the funds. Gutenberg's employee and son-in-law, Peter Schoffer, testified against him. Before this lawsuit was finalized, Gutenberg had printed a Latin Bible that contained 42 lines of Scripture per page. This "42-line Bible" is known as the Gutenberg Bible. The press for the Bible, Gutenberg's masterpiece, along with a second book containing only Psalms, was lost to Fust in the court case. The Psalter was published after the court case with no mention of Gutenberg; only Fust's and Schoffer's names appear as the printers.

Gutenberg never really bounced back financially from losing his press to Fust. He set up another printing press and continued to print, but because he did not put his name in the books and papers he produced, it is not known how much was produced as he competed with his old press shop. In 1465, an honorific title was bestowed on Gutenberg in recognition for his invention. This was accompanied by a salary that supported him until his death three years later. Gutenberg is often thought of as a contemporary of Luther, but in fact he died 15 years before Luther was born. In Paul's letter to the Ephesians, he declares that "we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (Eph. 2:10). The stage was set for the coming battle between Luther and his followers and the pope and his supporters.

The Reformation has often been called the war of pamphlets. Pamphlets, the quickest and most economical form of printing with moveable type, had been around for decades before Luther started to employ them, but the volume of pamphlets increased as much as one-thousandfold in the first few years after Luther nailed the 95 Theses to the church door. Printing shops sprang up all over Germany, and many came to Wittenberg like moths to a flame. Even the artist Lucas Cranach partnered in a printing business there.

Gutenberg's invention made books more obtainable for the first time in history. The book that helped codify the German language and that was used as a tool in teaching reading was Luther's German Bible. For the first time, Germans could read the Scriptures in their own language at a cost that was within reach for the common man.

Surely Gutenberg would have been amazed at the world-altering events that resulted from the works planned in advance for him to do.

HEALTHY HABITS

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, amongst all of the cancers, skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States. Approximately 9,000 people die of this every year. What's so alarming to discover, is that the rates of skin cancer continue to increase despite the fact that we know how to prevent it. The most preventable cause of skin cancer is exposure to ultraviolet light from the sun or artificial means like that of tanning beds. The two most common types of skin cancer are basal cell and squamous cell carcinoma. These two types are highly curable, however can be very expensive to treat and possibly disfiguring. The third type and most dangerous is melanoma which can cause death. Ultraviolet exposure causes more than 90% of the melanomas diagnosed in the United States. So, what is the answer to this critical problem? Prevention is the key! We need to understand that tanned skin is damaged skin. How do we protect ourselves? Wear a broad-spectrum sunscreen with at least an SPF of 15 or higher when going outdoors, even on cloudy days. Wear wide-brimmed hats, sunglasses, and protective clothing. Utilize shade during mid-day hours. Avoid sun-bathing and indoor tanning. These are all simple strategies that we can utilize to prevent a potential dangerous or even deadly cancer. Let's all step up to the plate and be good role models to our friends and family and let's help wipe out this potential devastating cancer! A PEAK PERFORMANCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

He who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all, how will He not also with Him graciously give us all things? - Romans 8:32 Climbing Mount Everest is the apex of adventure. Daniel Mazur hiked Everest seven times and is considered one of the world's best climbers. However, Daniel is best known for an Everest trek that went a different direction. Mazur recruited a local Sherpa named Jongbu as a guide for this 2006 trip. Andrew Brash and Myles Osborne each paid \$20,000 to join them. Sherpas like Jongbu lead expeditions to the 29,035foot summit with expert knowledge and skill. Their proficiency is essential, especially in the "death zone" above 26,000 feet where oxygen levels are too low to sustain life. Hikers breathe oxygen from bottles there. Without it, bodily functions weaken. Loss of consciousness and death often follow. Everest's other hazards include severe cold, snow, ice, high winds, and hidden crevasses. Injuries often turn fatal because rescuers in these extreme conditions literally risk their own deaths. The 2006 climb started well for Mazur's team, but two hours from the summit they saw a bright yellow flash. It was a man! Sitting alone near a 10,000-foot drop and hallucinating, Lincoln Hall had no equipment, sleeping bag, food, or water. He had discarded his hat and gloves and tied his jacket around his waist. Twelve hours earlier, Lincoln's guides thought he died, so they left him. They called his wife to say he hadn't made it. The team realized that Lincoln had frostbite, dehydration, and cerebral edema, a severe form of altitude sickness that causes brain swelling. They had a choice: radio for help, hope rescue arrived in time, and keep climbing; or stay until rescuers arrived. Staying would deplete supplies and end their ascent. Daniel's team didn't hesitate. They called and waited. They shared oxygen and provisions, even tethering Lincoln to the mountainside to keep him safe. The team gave up the summit to save a life. Without Christ, we live in a desperate state, much like Lincoln. Lost, alone, delusional, sinful, unable to help ourselves, we need a Savior. In love, God sent His own Son to pay for our sins on the cross. He raised Jesus to life and gives all who believe in Him new life and forgiveness of sin. God the Father gave up His Son to save our lives. Prayer: Lord, You rescued me from sin and death. You restored my soul. Help me walk before You in the land of the living and serve You with joy. Praise the Lord! Amen.
