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FACES OF THE REFORMATION



Martin Luther (the Early Years) Author of the 95 Theses which sparked the Reformation.

Luther was raised by God-fearing parents who sacrificed to give their son an education. Planning to become a lawyer, Martin Luther entered the University of Erfurt. (His courses in grammar, logic and rhetoric provided the tools Luther later used to study and interpret Scripture.) Law was a profession that was not only respected but would also ensure his ability to care for his parents in their later years. One day Luther was caught in a violent thunderstorm. He prayed to St. Anne, promising to become a monk if his life was spared. This was not a promise he took lightly. Much to the disappointment of his father, Luther shed his worldly life to enter the Augustinian monastery.

It was here that Luther fasted and prayed, constantly seeking to live a perfect and holy life for God's approval. This attempt to live a holy life included visiting and revering holy relics. There were relics that were reputed to be a splinter from the cross, or a branch from the burning bush, the hair of this saint or a piece of cloth from that one. Even Luther's trip to Rome, a city filled with more relics than any other in Europe, could not put his soul at ease. He could never be good enough for this righteous God. Despair set in. Luther's vicar (or priest), Johann von Staupitz, brought him to Wittenberg where he could mentor Luther more closely.

Luther began an in-depth study of the Bible while teaching at the University of Wittenberg. He continued this study after finishing his doctorate, believing that the Bible was more important than the teachings of the Church Fathers. In 1514, while studying Paul's letter to the Romans in his tower room, he finally saw the pure Gospel. He realized that sinners are saved not through good works but by the gift of God through faith. This insight into the Gospel and the assurance of his salvation gave him the confidence to overcome the challenges he would soon face.

The challenges began in the form of a man named Johann Tetzel. Tetzel was sent to Wittenberg to sell indulgences. After penitents confessed their sins, a priest might assign works of satisfaction as part of absolving sins. At first, indulgences were granted to Crusaders willing to sacrifice all in defense of the Church. Those who could not go could support the effort financially and also receive an indulgence, or pardon from sin.

This was so lucrative that the practice was soon used to raise funds for churches and hospitals, even infrastructure. Frederick the Wise would display his relics on All Saints Day, Nov. 1. The faithful could pay homage to the relics, pay money to Frederick and everyone would be happy at the end of the day; sins forgiven, revenues up. The three parts to penance changed from contrition, confession and absolution to contrition, confession and contribution.

Luther's concern was that there would no longer be any sense of true contrition. If sinners could receive pardon from all sins, then they could spend the rest of their lives not worrying about the statuses of their souls. He must protect his flock from this dangerous practice.

On Oct. 31, 1517, Luther posted his 95 Theses on the Castle Church doors, seeking a scholarly debate on the sale of indulgences. Although he wrote them in Latin, they were surreptitiously translated into German and distributed throughout the land, sparking the events that began the Reformation.

The Treasurer's report given by Wayne Eggert was read and approved.

Elders Report:

Brent Wohl reported that there will be two weddings taking place in March of 2017 at the church. It was also reported that the use of the common cup has been suspended for now, but will be brought back in the future.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor Williamson reported that Pastor Haynes has made visits the second week of the month to the shut-ins and has also given them communion and has handed out crosses which were made in Seward. Pastor Williamson reported that at the Board of Elders meeting on June 16, 2016 he was asked to be our vacancy pastor.

Pastor says he is becoming comfortable with the services and being here in general. He reported that services are planned through August, but that he will not be here the first week of September and that Pastor Koch will be here that day.

Pastor Williamson reported that he attended the Fish Boil, the July 11th Elders meeting, the LWML meeting and that he was planning on attending Ladies Aid on Wednesday and that he also attended the service that Pastor Ahlman spoke at. He also said he might be able to attend evening cell groups. The in-

stallation for Reverend Bensen will be held on Sunday July 31st at 3p.m. Pastor reported that work with Cathy is going well and also thanked the organists for their work.

Board of Education:

Cathy Hollman reported that Vacation Bible School was a success with approximately 25 kids in attendance each of the five evenings with six non-members attending. Sunday school will start on September 11 followed by a Teacher Appreciation Picnic. The meat will be provided, with the congregation bringing a covered dish. Cathy reported that there is need of a 4th grade Midweek teacher for the second half of the year. Midweek classes will start on Wednesday September 14.

Trustees Report:

Dolyn Meinke reported that the church grounds and cemetery have been mowed a few times, the air conditioner has been fixed, the ceiling fans have been oiled, Bob Renner has repaired the mower and that the parsonage is in good condition, but will need some general maintenance in the future.

Cemetery committee:

Chris Hollman reported that the irrigation system in the new berm is not working. Mitch Homolka will check with the company to see what they can do. Dean Prochnow is checking with a friend of his to see if he can help with surveying the new part of the cemetery.

Youth Group Committee:

Ashley Walker reported that they held the Easter Egg Hunt and had the Senior Dinner. They will start up again in August.

Evangelism Committee:

Ellie Koch reported that the sign they used for Vacation Bible School got trashed and will be looking for something new and better for future use. New Business:

The call committee has put together a report on the surveys and Gary Meinke will turn it in to District President Snow. Deadline for names submitted is the 1st Sunday of September.

It was reported that there are approximately 43 vacancies in our district. Vacancy Pastor James Haynes name has also been submitted as a candidate to be our pastor.

Pastor Brinkmeyer asked to speak on behalf of the Lambs of Christ Preschool. He first reported that he was six days away from being done serving as vacancy pastor at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Crete. Then he asked that we consider financially supporting the preschool. Because of declining enrollments and giving the teacher a much deserved raise. Wayne Eggert suggested we do a matching fund with congregation donations (with a fiscal year end \$1000.00 cap) like we do for Karen Tiedemans mission project.
