Psalm 1:1-2 (ESV) "Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night."

We are truly blessed by God when we live in the ways that are good and pleasing to our heavenly Father. The psalm says is very clearly. And God's Word is also very clear that those who walk in the ways of righteousness are truly blessed. And we can say that yes, we do walk in many of His ways. But ... we can always do better, can't we? For when it comes to walking in God's ways perfectly ... we fall short. Thanks be to God that we are saved by the right and good living of our Savior who did all things perfectly and credits His goodness to our account.

So it should be good for us to do as the psalmist states: meditate on the law of God day and night. I know that it is not possible for us to be in Bible Study all day. There is work to do and we are to be faithful in that so that we can feed and care for us and our families. But meditating on the Word of God (law) all the time means that we should apply the Word of God into all areas of our life. Our whole life is to be filled with right thinking and speaking and doing.

When we are at work we can consider how God would have us be at work. God wants us to be of certain character and that character is who we are all the time. God seeks to grow in us such characteristics of kindness, patience, concern, empathy, honesty, self-control, humility, etc. in ALL things. When we work in our daily jobs with these types of characteristics it pleases God.

It may happen that in some jobs you are asked to do something that you know is not right according to God's expectations. To fudge some numbers, to ignore an OSHA rule, to hush up part of a construction flaw, to ditch a report that indicates a flaw or shows a discrepancy—anything that goes against what is right and true by God's standards is wrong. It is sin. Meditating on the Word of God day and night is to consider how God would have us conduct ourselves at all times and in every relationship.

At all times we are to be the person God calls us to be.

And when we find that we have done wrong—we repent. Immediately. We try not to do what is wrong. But God calls us to repentance. But that too is from God's Word—repent and believe in Jesus for salvation and life. Pray for the Holy Spirit to help you remember God's Word and to apply it in all situations. Do what is good and right. And God will bless you for doing so. We are not granted salvation by what we do—we are only saved by faith in Jesus who lived and died and rose again. But we are blessed when we live the way we should each day.

God help us to delight in our salvation in Christ Jesus, to apply God's Word to all things, and to pray for the Holy Spirit to guide us in faith and life. Lord, help us to live as He wants us to live in constantly thinking about a putting to use His holy Word.

The minutes were read and approved.

Lynn Meinke made some additional comments on Treasurer's Report: Paid second quarter pledge of \$500 to the Ashers; gave Karen Tiedemann \$725 for her trip to Russia. Spent \$650 from building fund for land survey. A motion was made and seconded to add Chris Hollman as signer for the checks. Motion passed. There was a request to donate to the Nebraska Special Olympics. Last time we donated was in 2010 from the VBS. It was decided not to donate.

Pastor also reported on his own self-care and growth including:

Working on plans to be more efficient in his time and make visiting to members a higher priority

Will be taking a mostly working Vacation August 9 - 15 to get some things done at home and more long-range church planning time.

Will be taking another vacation - a resting vacation - after our fall activities get going; late September/early October

<u>Board of Education</u>...VBS was held from July 22-26. Average of 16 kids attended and included 4 non-members. Thanks to all the volunteers that helped make it a success.

Midweek parent meeting will be Wednesday, August 22 at 6:30 p.m. with first classes beginning the following week, August 29.

Sunday School will begin on Sunday, September 9. Rotations will still be used but divided into two age groups. Four teacher volunteers are needed from September through October. Teachers will not be committed to teach every Sunday. Please contact a Board of Ed member if interested. The Board is also in search of a Christmas Program Director. Practices will begin November 4.

<u>Trustees Report</u>...David Eggert reports the following:

- Mowed and General Maintenance
- Church clean up went well but more work needs to be done on the pew cushions
- UNL arborist looked at the trees and gave the following recommendations: Cut down the ash trees to the west of the church, the north, and south. Trim up the middle trees. Take out the elm by the garage. Clean out the windbreak. Get rid of the saplings and old mulberry. Put in two rows of cedars to the north and west of the windbreak. Put lilac bushes between pastor's fence and windbreak.
- We have funds for new pew cushions. The bid from Beatrice pew reconditioning business is around \$6800. Passed around samples. There was a motion to get new pew pads. Seconded. Motion carried. A motion was made to establish a fund that could be used for donations for this expense. Seconded. Motion carried.
- Need to change lights in the sanctuary to LED lights.
- Look at adding height to balcony railing. We need to add 12 inches to get height of 42 inches. Reported that cable would be \$500 and glass would be \$6,500. Trustees will do some additional research and report at next voter's meeting.
- Will burn tree pile this fall.

Cemetery Report...No report.

Youth Group...Adam Hughes-Hardt reports that the youth group had taken the summer off and will start back up on September 9.

<u>Evangelism Committee</u>...Tim McDermott reports that since the April Voters meeting, committee time was spent studying God's Word, in discussion and planning of varying topics including the following:

- Continued study and discussion of the book, "5 Things you can do to Witness Christ."
- 2020 Church Directories
- Membership Photo Board. Working to locate a group of church members who want to help to take photos of members and their families to be mounted on board. A church member has been kind enough to supply the work to accomplish the bulletin board in the church narthex for this purpose.
- "Everyone His Witness". Purchase was made of presentation with assistance from LCMS district. There was a signup sheet passed around to participate in this six-week long class, hoping to have 10 or 12 members willing to participate.
- Church Website statistics are being shared at each meeting
- The Board of Evangelism also continue their focus of "in reach" including continued prayer for our membership, a major component of the Evangelism Committee's work.

• Involvement in the Doane University 2018 Downtown Tour. The Council voted to approve \$200 for pens to be handed out.

<u>Memorial Committee</u>...Todd reports that they would like the Voters to approve one memorial addition: New candle lighters which will cost approximately \$250 for two. Motion made, seconded and carried.

<u>Old Business</u>...It was suggested that church cleanup day should be every spring providing a list of items of need.

President Henning reminded members to be keeping track of financial needs of any board they are on for future budgeting.

Tim McDermott and Glen Louch worked on project for replacement of the church video camera. A full report of their findings is attached to the minutes. Also asked Todd to bring up to the Memorial committee as this could be a Memorial project to be added to the list.

Building Committee...Continued discussion and progress toward a project plan including the following:

- In late April, the committee introduced Nate Meier of the Lutheran Church Extension Fund who presented a Demographic Survey of our congregation and spoke briefly on the potential funds that St. John could borrow if an addition project was to come.
- An initial site-survey was accomplished to obtain property corners, setbacks and elevations.
- Meetings held to discuss parking requirements seen in a multi-week site survey and general floor space needed in a proposed ground-level Fellowship Hall.
- Requests sent out to various church boards for description of wants/needs.
- Two meetings held in June in which invitations were provided to area architects. The committee asked for each firm to supply us with their anticipated architectural fees in the form of a proposal for their scope of work of which one firm provided the committee with a proposal.
- Asked Voters to consider accepting the proposal by Architectural Design Associates of Lincoln, NE, for \$3,500, plus reimbursable expenses which would include the following:
- Architectural services for this project will include schematic (preliminary) design of the building addition.
- ◊ Design drawings will include colored images, site plan and floor plan(s).
- Approximately two meetings with the church to discuss the design and present it to the congregation as needed.
- ◊ Preliminary budgeting for construction cost.
- ADA's scope of work is comprised of the following: Based on their site visit and meeting at the church on 6/13/18 and the design sketches provided, they proposed to provide preliminary site plan, floor plan, and exterior 3-D images for the addition to the existing church building. The addition will be approximately 3,000 square feet and may include a basement level if the functional layout requires.
- Specific functional spaces will include: the fellowship hall with table seating for 150; storage for tables and chairs; a new kitchen with an optional commercial hood; additional ADA compliant restrooms on each new floor, accessible entry from the exterior and through the existing building and an accessible stair to the sanctuary balcony.
- Site design will incorporate pedestrian access to the building along with adequate parking and vehicle maneuvering space.
- Final presentation documents will include 3-D views of the church with the addition; an overall site plan and scaled floor plan. Printed and electronic copies of the illustrations will be available for publicity purposes.
- If this project moves forward for full design for a building permit, they estimated their fee which includes structural, mechanical and electrical engineering to be about \$24,000 assuming a single level, slab on grade addition.

A motion was made and seconded to spend \$3,500 to ADA to begin process as outlined above. Motion carried.

<u>New Business</u>...Karen Tiedeman reports that four people will be going to Russia for one week in October to help at the Hannah House which is a home for girls over 18 to learn a trade. They are not needing financial assistance from the church. Orphan Grain Train is assisting.

Pastor Art Brinkmeyer thanked St. John for the dinner to recognize his years in the ministry. He commented that six congregations were represented. He felt this was a wonderful outpouring of love and expressed appreciation.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:30 p.m. and closed with the Lord's Prayer.

There were 56 members present and two guests.

RECIPE FROM THE KITCHEN OF SANDI KARL

ZUCCHINI STUFFING

7 cups sliced zucchini

1/4 cup chopped onion

1 can (10.5 oz) cream of chicken soup

1 cup sour cream

1 cup shredded carrots

¹/₄ cup oleo

2 cups herb seasoned stuffing mix

Combine zucchini & onion with 1/4 cup water.

Bake 15 minutes (microwave 4 min) or until tender.

Drain; combine soup & sour cream, stir in carrots.

Fold in zucchini & onion with melted oleo.

Alternate layers of stuffing mix and zucchini mixture,

Top with stuffing.

Bake 20 minutes (or microwave about 5 minutes)

Hint: *** I use one box of Stove Top Stuffing and

just fold into the entire mixture instead of trying to layer it.

*** If using the crock pot I do not cook anything separately

Just mix everything together and bake in the crock pot

on high for about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 hours

on low for about 4 to 5 hours




LUTHERAN WOMEN IN MISSION
